What is a Critical Access Hospital?

A Critical Access Hospital (CAH) is a designation given by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) to eligible rural hospitals, primarily to ensure access to care in underserved communities. These hospitals receive special benefits and financial support to help them remain operational and provide essential services to their communities.

Emergency Care

Providing emergency medical services and critical care for life-threatening situations 24/7.



Outpatient Services

Providing outpatient services and specialized care for non-emergency health needs, with a focus on convenience, quality, and personalized attention.



Inpatient Care

Providing 25-bed inpatient care services, with 96-hour average length of stay.



Surgical Procedures

Performing a wide range of surgical interventions, from minor procedures to complex surgeries.
